



Countable	Uncountable
There are a lot of eggs.	There's a lot of bread.
There aren't many eggs.	There isn't much bread.
Are there many eggs?	Is there much bread?

Rules

A lot of / Lots of goes before plural countable nouns and uncountable nouns in affirmative sentences.

Many goes before **plural countable** nouns in **negative** sentences and questions.

Much goes before **uncountable** nouns in **negative** sentences and **auestions**.

- A lot of, many, and much are all expressions that mean "a large quantity."
- We can use *a lot of* or *lots of* in the same way (lots is informal)

We use **How much ...?** With **uncountable** nouns.

We use **How many ...?** with **countable** nouns.

Rules.

We use **a few** with uncountable nouns. We use **a little** with plural countable nouns.

Examples.

There's a little milk. There are a few tomatoes.
